The bill included a damaging policy rider that would lock in an antiquated definition of what constitutes waters of the United States, endangering streams and wetlands that Americans rely on for drinking water and flood prevention. [<a href="#">House roll call vote 345, 7/10/13</a>]</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li> <p><b>Peters also voted to remove the dirty water rider from the bill.</b> Peters voted in favor of an amendment to H.R. 2609 that would remove a dirty water policy rider from the bill that threatens waters Americans depend on for drinking, swimming, and fishing. The rider would bar the Army Corps of Engineers from restoring longstanding Clean Water Act protections to critical streams and wetlands across the nation. It would prohibit the Army Corps from limiting pollution in waterways that supply public drinking water for 117 million Americans and block the Army Corps' efforts to protect wetlands that are critical for flood protection. [<a href="#">House roll call vote 311, 7/9/13</a>]</p> </li> </ul> <p><b>Peters voted to ensure the safe and productive use of our nation's oceans.</b> Peters voted against an amendment to H.R. 3080, the Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2013, which would block implementation of ocean policy programs that would improve the health and management of our oceans. The amendment would prohibit the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers from coordinating with states, other agencies, and the public on plans to ensure the safe and productive use of our nation's oceans and Great Lakes.
