Heller Voted To Confirm Betsy DeVos To Be Secretary Of Education. In February 2017, Heller voted to confirm Betsy DeVos to be Secretary of Education. The nomination was confirmed 50-50, with the vice president breaking the tie. [PN37, Vote 54, 2/7/17]

Heller Voted To Confirm Rex Tillerson To Be Secretary Of State. In February 2017, Heller voted to confirm Rex Tillerson to be Secretary of State. The nomination was confirmed 56-43. [PN25, Vote 36, 2/1/17]

Heller Voted To Rubberstamp Trump's Dangerous Agenda Of Deregulating Bedrock Environmental Protections

Heller Voted To Use Extreme Legislative Tool To Overturn Stream Protection Rule, Which Protected Waterways From Coal Waste. In February 2017, the New York Times reported, "Using an obscure law that allows Congress to review regulations before they take effect, the Senate voted to reverse the Stream Protection Rule, which seeks to protect the nation's waterways from debris generated by a practice called surface mining. The Interior Department had said the rule would protect 6,000 miles of streams and 52,000 acres of forests by keeping coal mining debris away from nearby waters." Heller voted for the joint resolution, passed 54-45. President Trump signed it into law. [H.J.Res.38, Vote 43, 2/2/17; New York Times, 2/2/17]

 CRS Report: Stream Protection Rule Would "Reduce Human Exposure To Contaminants In The Drinking Water, And The Probability Of Adverse Health Effects." According to the New York Times, "A report released by the Congressional Research Service last month laid out the environmental and health benefits of the rule. Stream restoration requirements would reduce human exposure to contaminants in the drinking water, and the probability of adverse health effects, the report said. The replanting of trees also required by the rule would increase



carbon storage and reduce emissions, aiding in the fight against climate change, the report said." [New York Times, 2/2/17]

Heller Voted To Use Extreme Legislative Tool To Overturn Disclosure Rule Aimed At Curbing Bribery And Corruption. In February 2017, the New York Times reported, "Using an obscure law that allows Congress to review regulations before they take effect, the Senate ... moved to reverse a separate rule requiring publicly traded oil, gas and mineral companies to disclose payments to foreign governments for licenses or permits. The disclosure rule was aimed at curbing bribery and at helping resource-rich developing countries hold fossil-fuel companies, and their governments, accountable." Heller voted for the joint resolution, which passed 52-47. President Trump signed it into law. [H.J.Res.41, Vote 51, 2/3/17; New York Times, 2/2/17]

Oil Industry Heavily Lobbied Against Anti-Corruption Rule; Sec.
Of State Rex Tillerson Was "One Of The Most Outspoken
Opponents." In February 2017, The Hill reported, "The oil
industry has made it a priority to lobby against the SEC rule.
Exxon Mobil Corp., whose former CEO, Rex Tillerson, was
confirmed this week as secretary of State, was one of the most
outspoken opponents, owing in part to its business operations in
scores of countries around the world." [The Hill, 2/3/17]

Pruitt's spent his career suing the EPA, and argued that mercury and arsenic "pose no public health hazard." **Pruitt Sued EPA 14 Times.** According to an article in the New York Times, "[Pruitt's] antipathy to federal regulation — he sued the Environmental Protection Agency 14 times — in many ways defined his tenure as Oklahoma's attorney general." [New York Times, 1/14/17]

Pruitt Argued That The EPA Wrongly Claimed That Mercury Poses Public Health Hazards. In January 2017, The Nation wrote, "Pruitt made other attempts to soften his record on environmental health threats, particularly on climate change and mercury. On Wednesday Pruitt claimed he to be 'concerned' about mercury, and acknowledged that the neurotoxin is 'very dangerous.' A few years ago, however, he sued twice to block mercury regulations, arguing in one filing that 'the record does not support EPA's findings that mercury...pose[s] public health hazards.'" Pruitt Signed Joint Brief That Stated: "The Record Does Not Support EPA's Findings That Mercury, Non-Mercury HAP Metals, And Acid Gas Haps Pose Public Health Hazards." According to a joint brief signed by Scott Pruitt, "In 2005, EPA determined after extensive rulemaking that EGU HAP emissions do not cause hazards to public health and, therefore, that §112 regulation of EGU HAP emissions was neither appropriate nor necessary. Now, EPA would reverse that

Finally, the record does not support EPA's findings that mercury, non-mercury HAP metals, and acid gas HAPs pose public health hazards." Non-mercury HAP metals include arsenic, chromium, and nickel.
