Subject: Ahead of FL Debate - FL Voters Say Environment and Climate Change Are

Priority, Want Action on Climate Change

Date: June 20, 2019

Ahead of the first 2020 Democratic debate in Florida and on the heels of President

Trump's reelection kickoff in Florida, a new Public Policy Polling survey finds that

environmental and climate issues are important to a majority (57%) of Florida voters.

Only 13% think the environment and climate change are not very important, and only 5%

think they are not important at all. It is not surprising that Florida voters are concerned

about climate change and the environment given the impacts they are seeing, from sunny

day flooding to red tide and algal blooms.

Voters also support moving to a completely clean energy economy by 2050 by 37 points,

with 58% of voters in support and only 21% opposing. Among independents, support rises

to 63%, with only 14% opposing a move to completely clean energy by 2050.

As he starts his campaign, approval of President Trump's job performance on the

environment and climate issues is down 14 points in Florida, with 51% of voters

disapproving and only 37% approving. The margin is even wider among critically

important independent voters, with 61% disapproving and only 24% approving.

ON THE ISSUES

On individual issues surrounding the environment and climate change:

• By 69 points (80-11%) Florida voters support restoring rules that stop polluters

from putting toxins in the water and air.

• By 41 points (64-23%) voters support setting a new national clean energy standard

that would require a majority of Florida's electricity to come from clean and

renewable energy sources like solar and wind power.

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• By 38 points (61-23%) voters support banning campaign donations from big oil, other fossil fuels, and the utility companies.

CLIMATE ACTION

Florida voters find five reasons to act on climate change convincing:

- Public health experts say climate change threatens the quality of the air and water, putting harmful pollutants in the air and fueling outbreaks of toxic algae and red tide. 62% of voters find this a convincing argument to act on climate change, with a plurality (43%) finding it a very convincing argument. Among independents, a further 49% find it very convincing.
- Once rare events like "500-year floods" are happening regularly and the sea-level will rise, endangering Florida's coastline. 58% of voters find this a convincing reason to act on climate change, with a plurality (43%) of voters finding it very convincing.
- Climate change is a public health emergency, releasing toxic chemicals that
 increase the risk of asthma attacks and heart disease nationwide each year. 56% of
 voters find this argument for climate action convincing, with a plurality (36%)
 finding it a very convincing reason.
- China and other countries have started responding to climate change and growing their clean energy sector at a much faster rate than the US. 55% of voters find this argument for climate action convincing, with a plurality (38%) finding it very convincing.
- In the past two years, more than 3,000 Americans died in climate-related disasters. 53% of voters find this a convincing reason to act on climate change, with a plurality (37%) finding it a very convincing reason to act.

PPP surveyed 679 Florida voters from June 14-16, 2019. The margin of error is +/- 3.8%. 71% of interviews for the survey were conducted by telephone and 29% over the Internet to reach respondents without landline telephones. The poll was conducted on behalf of LCV.
