Dear Leader Schumer:

This letter is regarding the nomination of Laura Daniel Davis to serve as the Assistant Secretary of Land and Minerals Management at the U.S. Department of the Interior, a position with tremendous importance to the nation's energy leasing and development activities. Laura is highly qualified for this position, having served as Chief of Staff to both Interior Secretaries Sally Jewell and Ken Salazar, and in a leadership role at the Department during the Clinton administration. She has also worked on Capitol Hill for then-Congressman Mark Udall, and as the Chief of Policy and Advocacy at the National Wildlife Federation.

In her previous positions at Interior, Laura gained a bird's-eye view of the Department and the important work conducted by all 70,000 employees. In her testimony before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee on September 21, 2021, Laura described her preparation and motivation for this position: "In addition to my family, the Department of the Interior has been one of the most significant and formative influences on my life. The leadership positions I have held have given me knowledge of the public lands, the energy programs—both on and offshore—a deep understanding of the Department's operations, and the importance of collaboration."

Despite her obvious qualifications and experience, the consideration of Laura's nomination has languished; her nomination was announced on June 24, 2021–more than 500 days ago. In that time, she has twice appeared before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee for a confirmation hearing, a highly unusual request.

The delayed consideration of Laura's nomination is costly beyond the number of days since it was announced. The Assistant Secretary for Land and Minerals Management (ASLM) plays a critical role in reviewing and approving energy development activities on our nation's public lands and offshore, including the approval of necessary transmission infrastructure to bring energy to market. The ASLM oversees the agencies responsible for ensuring the safety and accountability of offshore energy development, and the oversight of coal mining and reclamation of abandoned coal mines. It is a big job, and Laura is most certainly up to the task. Not having confirmed leadership in this role to oversee the four government agencies under the ASLM's purview can be considered equivalent to a corporation of nearly 12,000 employees without a CEO.

Additionally, the successful implementation of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) depends on knowledgeable and effective public servants like Laura to evaluate and approve renewable energy projects that will bring our nation closer to reaching President Biden's goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions 50 percent by 2030. It is not an exaggeration to suggest that leaving this position vacant puts the commitments agreed to in the IRA at risk, not to mention the president's clean energy and climate goals. For example, the White House has said it wants to pledge 30 gigawatts of new offshore wind energy by 2030, requiring the approval of 16 wind farms by the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, one of the agencies under the ASLM's purview. The Assistant Secretary will play a critical role in reviewing and approving the permits for these projects.

The women who have signed this letter in their personal capacity know Laura Daniel Davis -as a friend, a colleague, a mentor, and a leader. We have observed her leadership in action and we know she gets results. Laura's knowledgeable, inclusive, and confident approach to challenging issues is admirable and demonstrates the importance of having women in high-level leadership positions. Laura is thoughtful, smart, strategic, collaborative, and determined. She sets a fine example that inspires and motivates her team to work harder. Her policy acumen is unmatched, and she has a delightful sense of humor that helps remind those around her why this work matters. Given the opportunity, any one of us would be honored to work with Laura again.

We urge you to bring Laura's nomination to the floor for a final confirmation vote before Congress adjourns for the year. Leadership in government matters, and it would be a significant loss to the federal workforce if Laura is not confirmed to this position.
